Mendeley provides strong collaboration features and includes a social networking component that enables researchers to share publications and collaborate with peers. It also offers effective PDF management and annotation tools. Nevertheless, concerns related to data ownership and dependency on a commercial publisher may limit its adoption among some researchers. It is best suited for research teams and collaborative academic environments.

EndNote is considered one of the most advanced citation management tools due to its powerful research management capabilities, extensive citation style library, and strong integration with databases and word processors. Despite these advantages, the software requires a paid license, which may restrict access for independent researchers. It is generally preferred by professional researchers and institutions conducting large-scale research projects.

RefWorks is primarily used in institutional settings because it operates through a web-based platform and is often provided through university library subscriptions. Its ease of access and collaborative features make it convenient for academic communities. However, it requires an institutional subscription, and offline functionality is relatively limited.

Finally, Citavi stands out for its comprehensive knowledge organization features, allowing users to manage references, notes, and research tasks within a single platform. This makes it highly useful for structured research projects. However, its limited compatibility with operating systems beyond Windows reduces its accessibility for some users.

## 9. Conclusion

Citation management tools play an important role in improving the efficiency and quality of research writing. Tools such as Zotero, Mendeley, EndNote, RefWorks, and Citavi help researchers collect, organize, and cite references accurately.
